

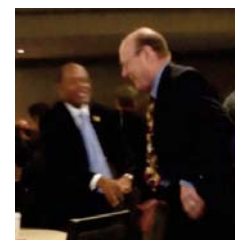

School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development Training United States Veterans to Combat Cyber Crime



The School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development launched the first cohort of the District's Cyber Defender Program. This program represents a partnership between the District, Veterans Administration (VA), Merit Network and Mile2. The District Cyber Defender program offers a world-class, intensive, 12-week training to 18 students, 13 of which are U.S. military veterans. The program will enable students to develop detection and reaction skills through simulations and exercises provided by a full curriculum of critical cybersecurity training. Upon completion of the program, each student will test for five nationally recognized certifications in cyber security.

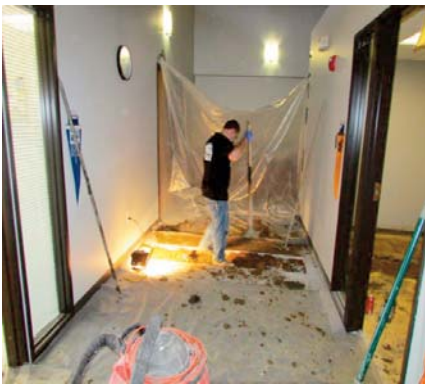


Project Lighthouse

More than 30 businesses in the Central Business District are participating in this project. It's a new Detroit River neighborhood watch program spanning from I-375 to the Lodge Freeway and from the Detroit Medical Center to the Detroit River.

Anyone who is lost, separated from friends, having vehicle trouble or experiencing other safety concerns can call for assistance. Participating locations have security personnel available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and display banners and logos to identify them as safe havens.

The Division of Administration and Finance and the Financial Aid Department have worked diligently over the past several weeks to complete the annual Fiscal Operations Report and Application to Participate (FISAP) report. A meticulous process is followed to ensure the integrity of the District's Title IV funding.

Financial reporting is a requirement of all institutions of higher education. While requirements and statements may differ from sector to sector, it is imperative that both institutions quarterly and annually highlight and capture their financial position for a specific period in time. Not only does this provide information for institution creditors, debtors, and other constituents; it is also a useful tool for establishing trends.

NEW STUDENTS

STEP 1 – APPLY FOR ADMISSION

All new students are required to complete WCCCD’s online orientation by logging on to www.wcccd.edu.

STEP 2 – ASSESSMENT

For new students, assessment is discussed and a referral made for the COMPASS test.

Following testing, students will meet with an academic advisor who will interpret test scores.

STEP 3 – ENROLLMENT DATA VERIFICATION

Staff members will verify residency, personal data, check for financial holds, and refer students to an academic advisor.

STEP 4 – ACADEMIC ADVISING

Students meet with an academic advisor to discuss educational goals and select courses.

STEP 5 – REGISTRATION

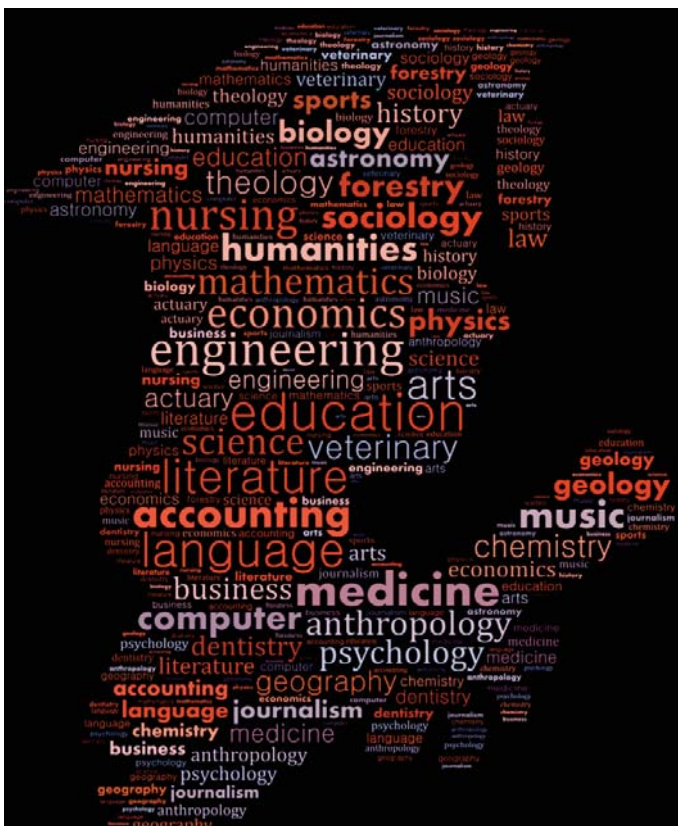
Confirm your student email address in Web-Gate.

STEP 6 – PAYMENT

Make payment via WebGate.

STEP 7 – PHOTO ID CARD

Obtain official student ID card and parking sticker at the Campus Security Office and sign up for Emergency Alert.

Step 1 - Current students should update mailing address and phone number.

Step 2 – Enrollment Data Verification

Staff members will verify residency, personal data, check for financial holds, and refer students to an academic advisor.

Step 3 – Registration

Course registration information is entered into the computer via WebGate.

Step 4 – Payment

Make payment via WebGate.

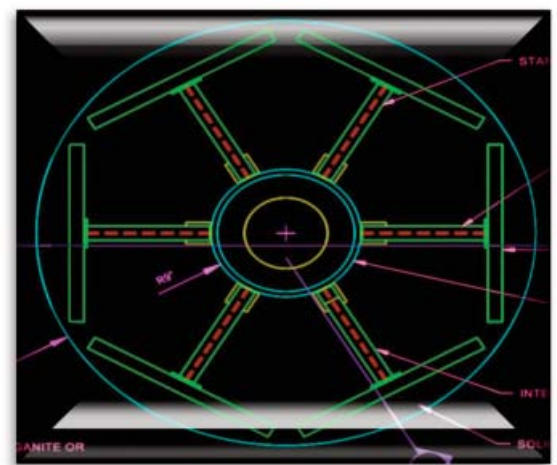
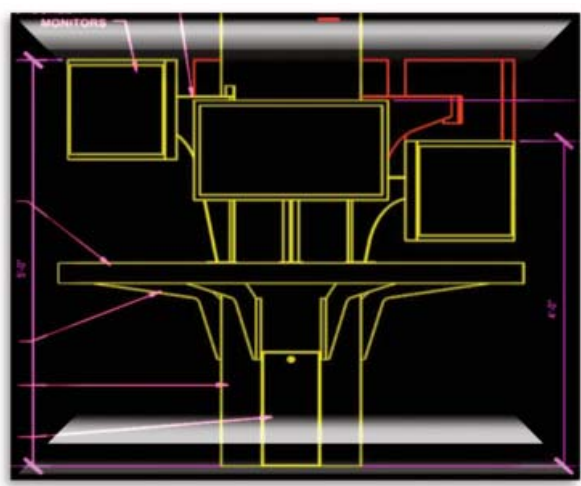
WEEKLY UPDATE

Student Kiosk

Phase II of the student kiosk project is in the works.

Status and Next Steps

- *Design of the Kiosk facility has been completed.
- *Location at each campus has been identified.
- *Design accommodates six Kiosk machines and it is ADA compliant.



The new and improved student kiosk will be deployed to all remaining campuses and will be available to students for the Spring 2015 semester.

VOIP (Voice Over IP)

Status and Next Steps

- VOIP pilot project at the Mary Ellen Stempfle University Center – Center for Distance Learning kicked off with 17 phones.
- The remaining phones at the Mary Ellen Stempfle University Center will be migrated to VoIP as the second phase of the pilot project.
- SIP Trunk – AT&T is running new fiber to the District Office Building and will be installing equipment needed to support our SIP (Session Initiation Protocol) trunk. SIP service will be in production in eight weeks.
- The deployment plan for District Office Building and the other campuses is being developed

WCCCD VoIP and SIP Trunk Technology

Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) is based on an IP standard that is capable of transmitting voice and data packets on the same network. This technology will allow any District phone to place voice calls, conference calls and set up videoconferences with any other district phone or computer on our own network. Session Initiation Protocol (SIP) is what controls voice and video communications across the IP network. A SIP Trunk (a digital circuit) is what's used to connect our network with an Internet Telephony Service Provider (XO Communications) for making calls outside of the District.

Key Benefits of WCCCD VoIP

- Improved district call centers with intelligent call routing
- Ability to broadcast campus or District-wide emergency or administrative messages to phones



Office of Accountability and Transparency



The Continuous Quality Improvement Audit Center collects, reviews and conducts monthly reconciliations and on-going audits of all District data. A systematic approach is used to procure data from multiple sources, allowing for collective knowledge through accountability and transparency. 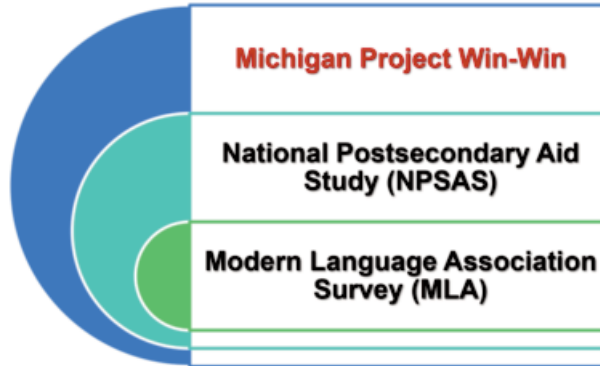
With the rise of online education, the notion of a “global classroom” has been the central focus of discussion with our international partners.

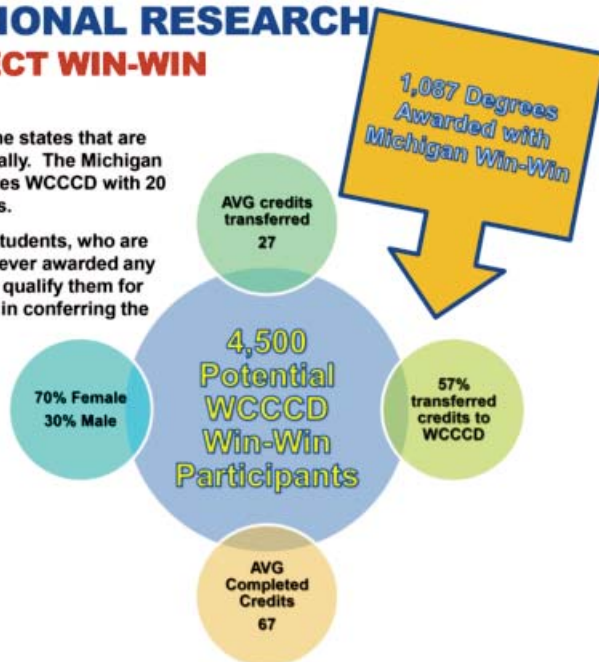
WCCCD & NATIONAL RESEARCH MICHIGAN PROJECT WIN-WIN

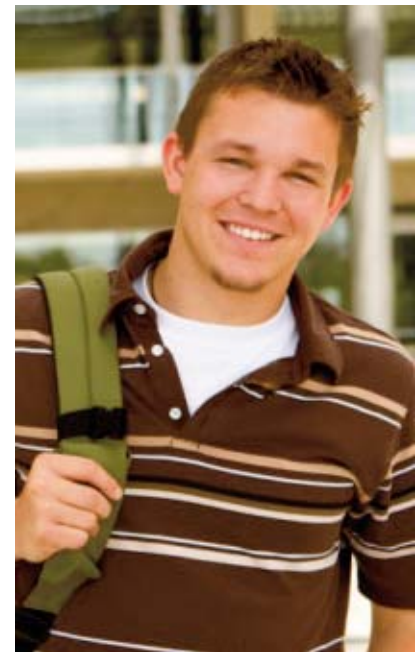

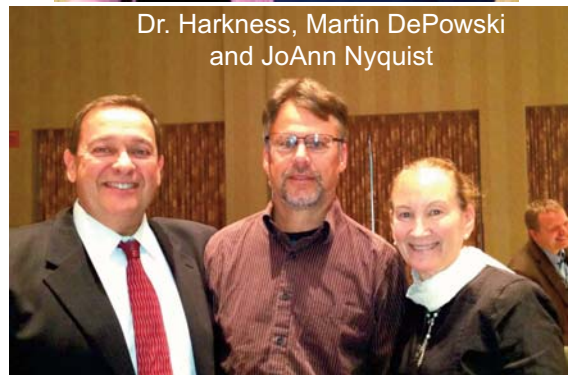
Office of Career Education

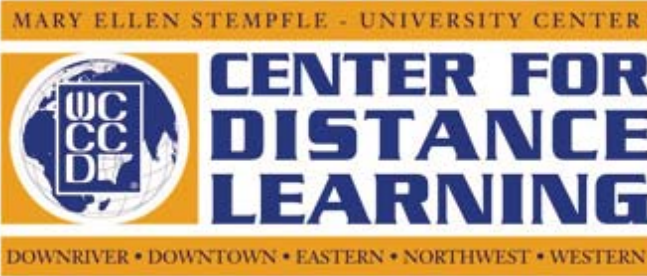

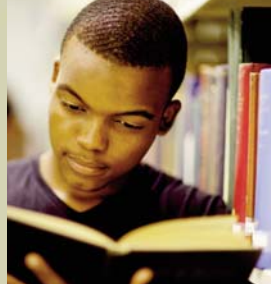

President Initiative – Senior Citizen Day

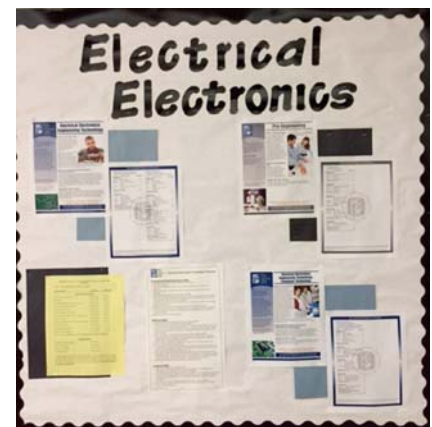

Legislative Corner

Michigan New Jobs Training Program:

One of the Michigan Community College Association's top legislative priorities for the fall session is passing legislation that would make three adjustments to the Michigan New Jobs Training Program. Senate Bill 1074, which makes those changes, is expected to come up for testimony in the House Commerce Committee after the October recess.

Gainful Employment Regulations Expected Shortly:

The U.S. Department of Education is expected to release final regulations on gainful employment by October 31. Virtually all community college certificate programs that are eligible for federal student aid will be covered under the regulations.

MCL 389.142- Fiscal Impact

The bill would have an indeterminate impact on community college districts, which would depend on whether these expanded investment options resulted in a higher return for colleges.

Senate Bill 1088

This bill would amend the Community College Act to expand investment options for community colleges debt retirement funds, building and site funds, building and site sinking funds, or general funds of the community college district. The bill would include investments in obligations of any of the State's political subdivisions that at the time of purchase are rated as investment grade by at least one standard rating service.

House Bill 4472

A bill to establish an educational grant program for eligible resident students who attend public community colleges and universities in this state; to provide for the administration of the program; to create the Michigan higher education grant trust fund; and to provide for the powers and duties of certain state governmental officers and entities.

The Heinz C. Prechter Educational and Performing Arts Center hosted the latest in the All About the Arts Coffee Series. Students and community members enjoyed the jazz and blues of Kansas City and the Southwest as performed by RJ Spangler and his band.



Mega Conference Academic Quiz Bowl

The Downriver Campus hosted the Mega Conference Academic Quiz Bowl weekly competition. This is a high school sanctioned competition in which 16 academic teams from the Mega Conference compete in jeopardy style matches. Each team consists of four students with alternates playing for each high school.



Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education

AWR-140 WMD Radiological/Nuclear Awareness Course

The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education (MIPSE) conducted a Weapons for Mass Destruction Radiological/Nuclear overview designed for first responders and other personnel who are likely to be the first to arrive on the scene of a radiological/nuclear incident. It focuses on the basics of radiation, possible health effects, hazard identification, and proper notification procedures.

MIPSE hosted Healthlink Medical Transportation's Coaching the Emergency Vehicle Operator (CEVO) Ambulance training. The goal of the CEVO course is to facilitate the student's knowledge of the laws involving the operation of an emergency vehicle, with practical hands-on operations.

Region 2 South – Regional Long Term Care Workgroup Meeting

MIPSE also hosted Region 2 South for a Regional Long Term Care Workgroup Meeting to discuss the recent changes in the emergency preparedness protocol that will affect long term care facilities in Michigan.
