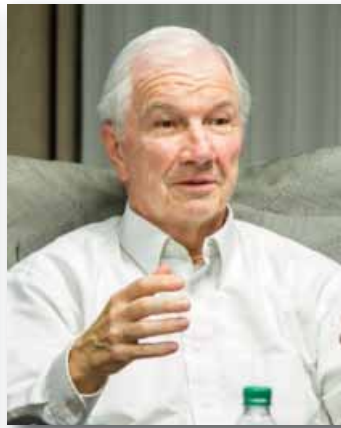

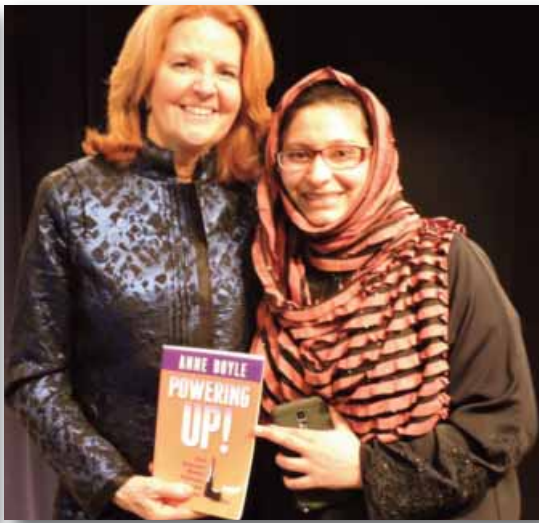

GRANTS - WCCCD Awarded \$500,000 To Support Aged-Out Foster Youth

The State of Michigan Department of Health & Human Services has awarded the District the Foster Youth Grant for Development Services for \$500,000. In partnering with Wayne State University Transition to Independence (TIP) program, WCCCD will support students who aged-out of the foster care system to college success, including completion of an Associate Degree, transfer to a four-year college/university, or employment. The grant will also support in all areas of life skills, to include:

TRAINING - HESI Prep Course

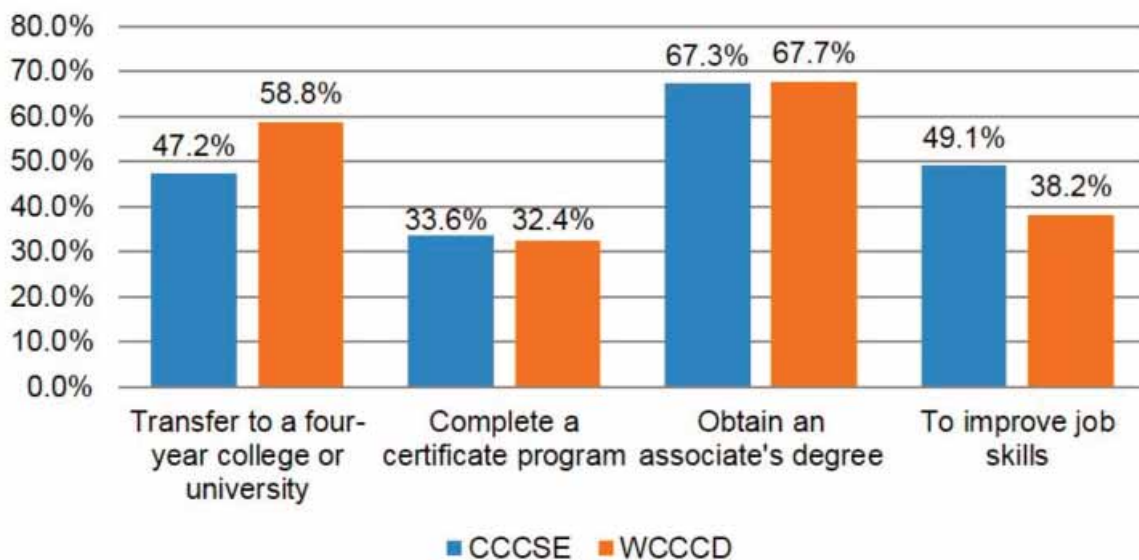
What's Trending in IE: First-Generation Students

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness conducts comparative research analysis on national trends related to community college student populations. First-generation students are first in their families to attend college, meaning neither of their parents have ever “attended college.”

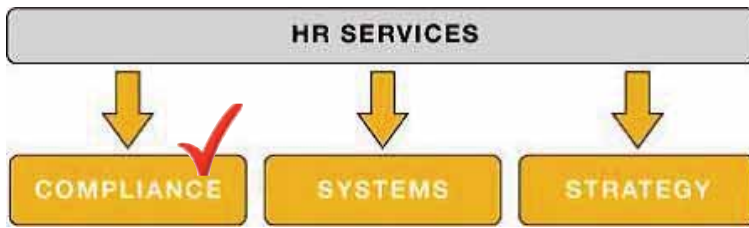
WCCCD participated in the national Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) that asks students about their college experiences. Below you will find sample data points from WCCCD new entering first-generation students compared to CCSSE national data findings.

*First-generation students represent **42%** of WCCCD students. The average age of a WCCCD first-generation student is **35**.*

Affordable Care Act – Reconciliation Update of Form 1095



HR is currently auditing the data for the ACA compliance of timely submission of returns. Form 1095 contains the information for employees about health coverage offered to them. Employees can use this information/form to report the insurance coverage on filing their 2015 Tax return.

Key Data Gathering Points of ACA :

Who are our full-time employees: This analysis may be fairly complex when factoring in new hires and part time employees who average more than 30 hours per week.

What offer of coverage did we provide to these individuals: Understanding the different levels of coverage, and the eligibility requirements for each level.

Was the offer of coverage affordable: Comparing benefit plans and coverage levels becomes more complex as the number of options offered.

Which employees were offered coverage and accepted it: A view of the complete landscape of coverage in an organization can give greater insight into potential risks or areas for adjustment.

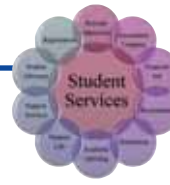
Dental Hygiene Annual Legislative Luncheon

District-wide Wireless Infrastructure Project Update

The District-wide Wireless Infrastructure implementation project team will be finalizing the wireless upgrade at the Western College this week. This installation will include the use of Cisco Identity Services Engine (ISE), a security policy management platform that automates and enforces context-aware security access to network resources. This platform will use secure authentication to provide network resource access to students and staff members, while limiting guest users to general Internet access. The configurations and policy management procedures defined at this campus will be rolled out to the other colleges. The installation of the new access points at the Eastern College began this week and will be completed next week.

VoIP Call Handling Procedure Project Update

A District-wide program to optimize call handling procedures and introduce new VoIP phone features to each of the college is underway. To date, the Division of Information Technology has reviewed the call handling at the Downtown, Western and Northwest colleges. 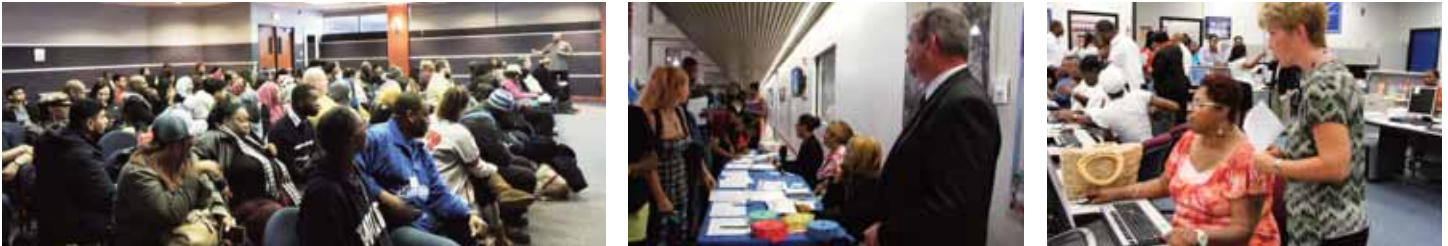

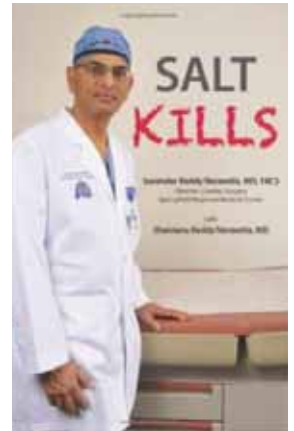

Celebrating Diversity Discussion

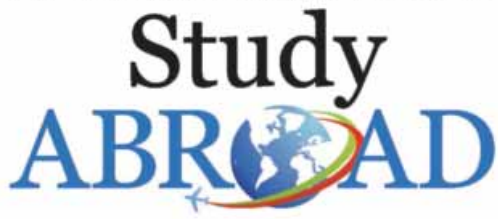

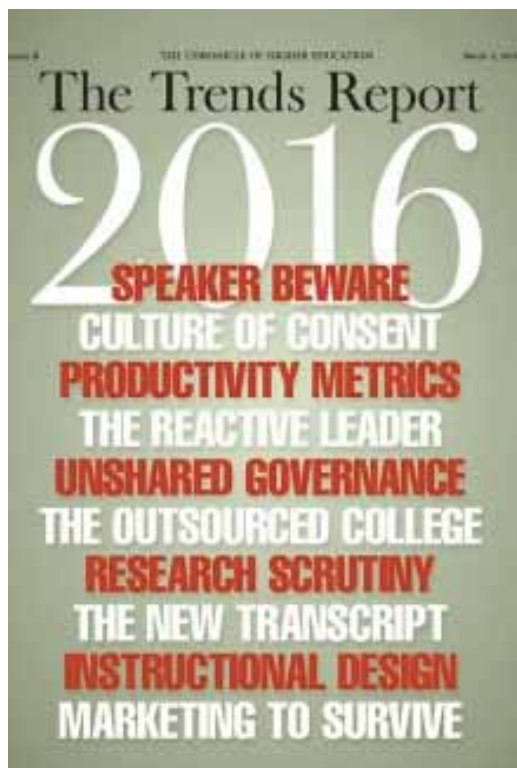


Transfer of the Associate Degree Task Force: The task force aimed at improving full transfer of the associate degree has completed its work and submitted it by the March 1 deadline to the Legislature (see the final task force report to the Legislature). Although the task force has agreed that participation in next steps should be voluntary, it is clear this issue remains critical to legislators, who have already expressed an interest in requiring a report on further progress by March 2017.

News . . .

Edgar Vann received his Public Policy and Social Research Fellowship Certificate from the Michigan Political Leadership program at Michigan State University.

Report...Half of Community College Students Report Mental Health Problems: Newly released results of a survey of community college students found that almost 50 percent of those surveyed had a current or recent mental health problem. The Wisconsin HOPE Lab, a research organization, surveyed 4,000 students at 10 community colleges across seven states. The resulting report found that 36 percent of respondents suffered from depression, and 29 percent had struggled with anxiety. Those rates are higher than those among students at four-year institutions. According to the report, fewer than half of the community college students with a mental health condition were receiving treatment.



Report...Chronicle of Higher Education Top Ten Trends (see the report's Executive Summary): (1) a fresh wave of attacks on free speech, often coming from students; (2) efforts by colleges to combat sexual assault by creating new cultural norms on the campus; (3) the growing use of metrics to measure faculty productivity; (4) the need for college leaders to react quickly to events that could quickly spin out of control; (5) widespread attacks on shared governance; (6) the outsourcing of services that are a core part of a college's mission; (7) increased scrutiny of academic research; (8) a movement to overhaul the college transcript; (9) the rise of the instructional designer; and (10) a reliance on better marketing to survive enrollment challenges and create a stronger institutional identity.

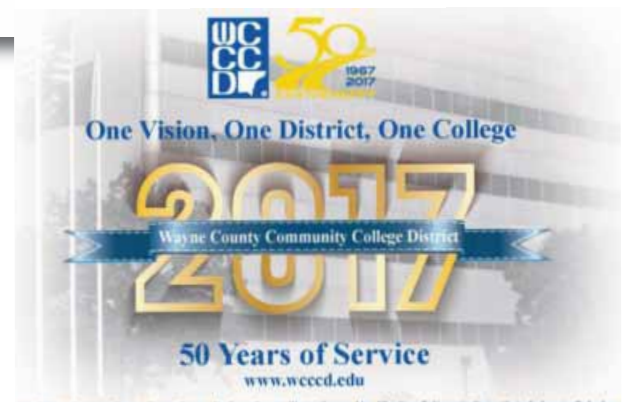

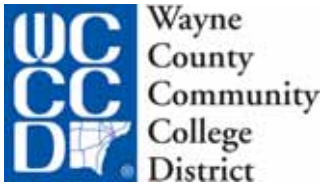
