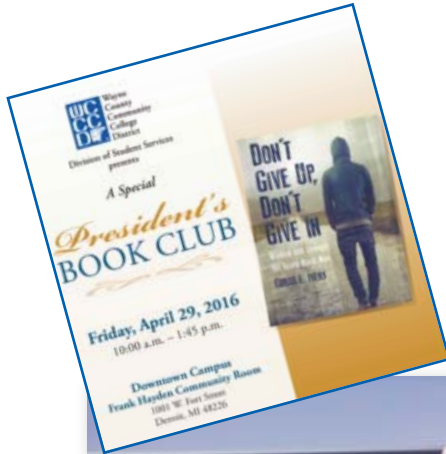
Student Executive Council Helping Students



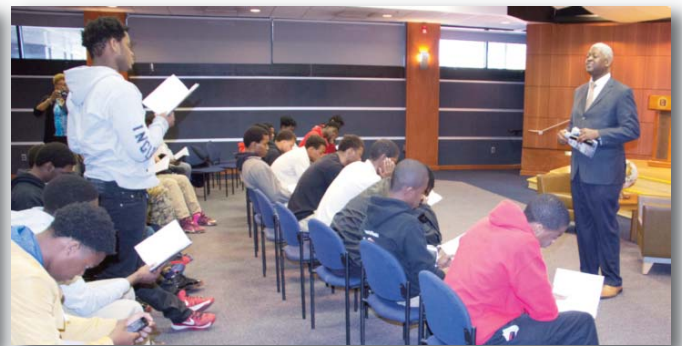
Representatives from the Student Executive Council are helping fellow students with the registration process for Summer 2016.

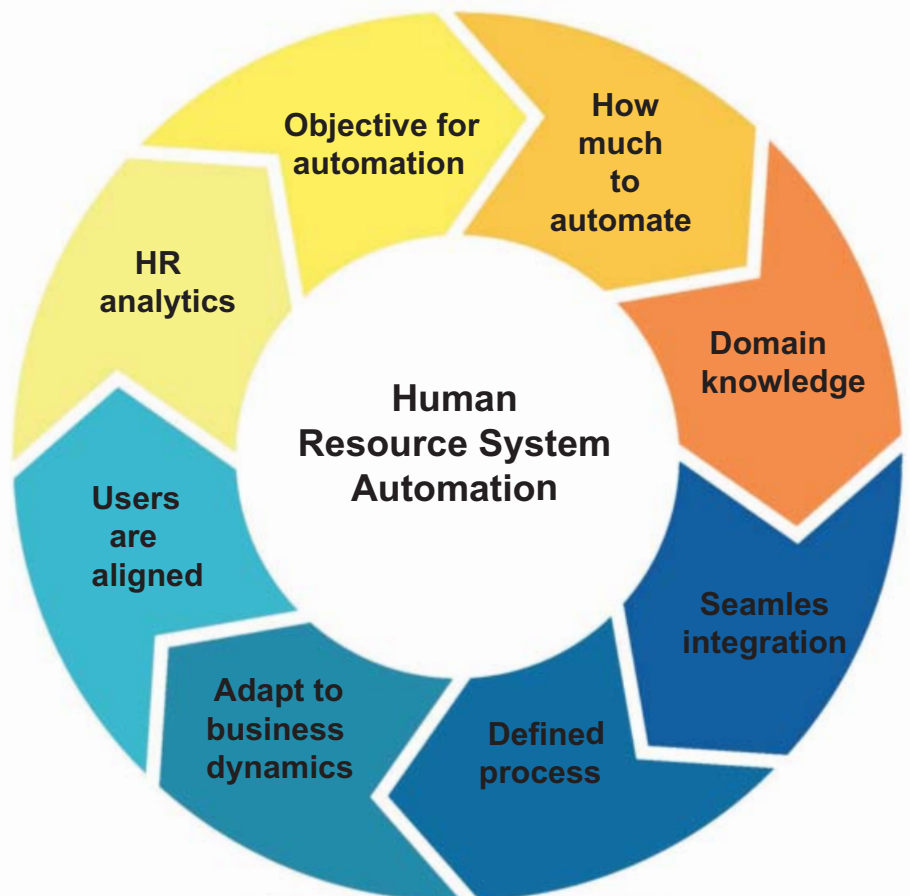

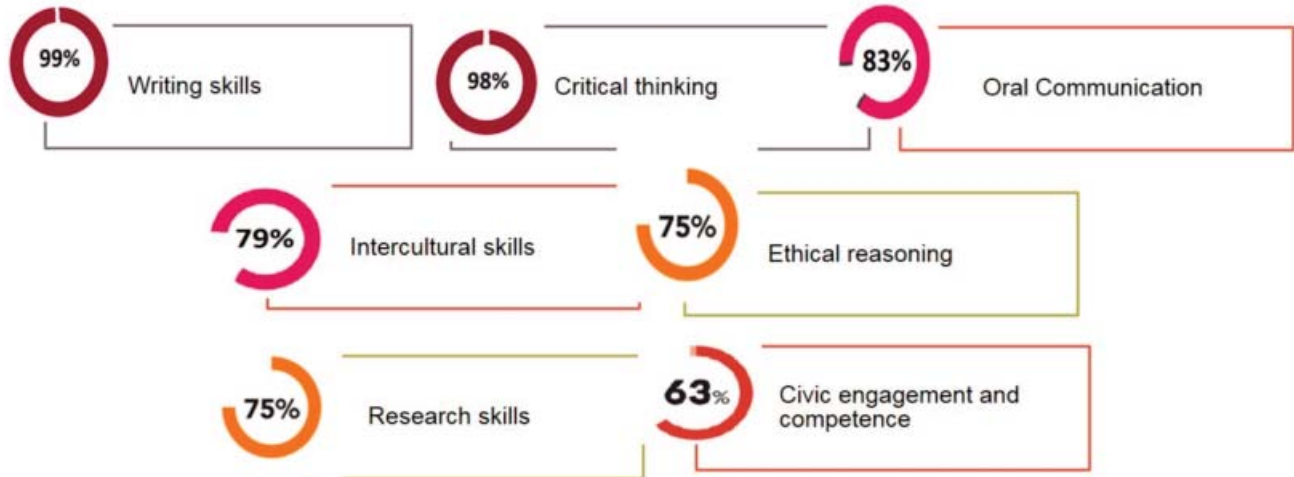

What's Trending in IE: Learning Outcomes

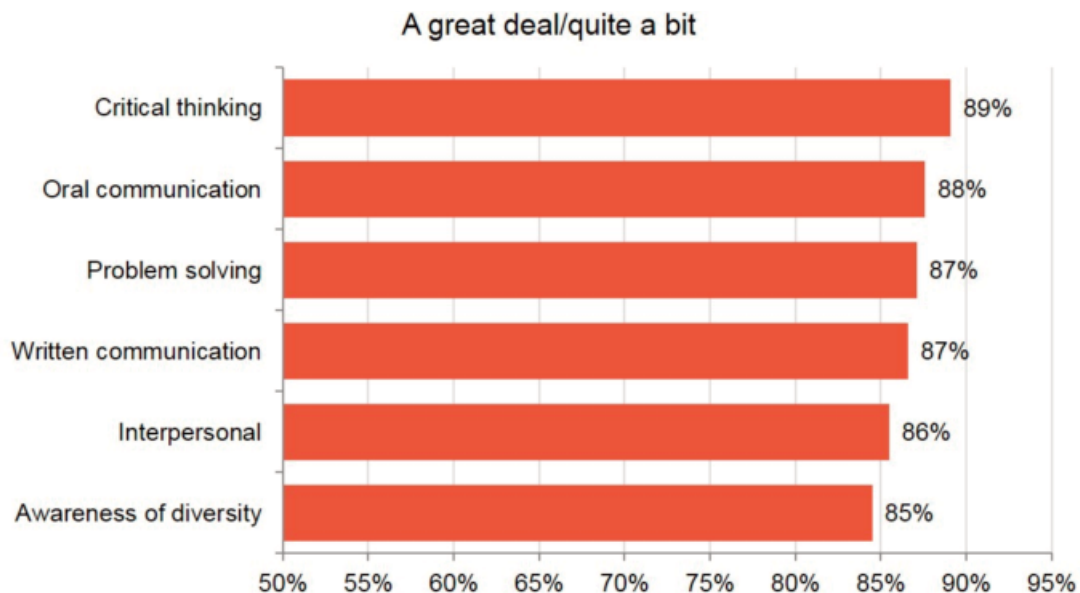

Prep-U Demonstration

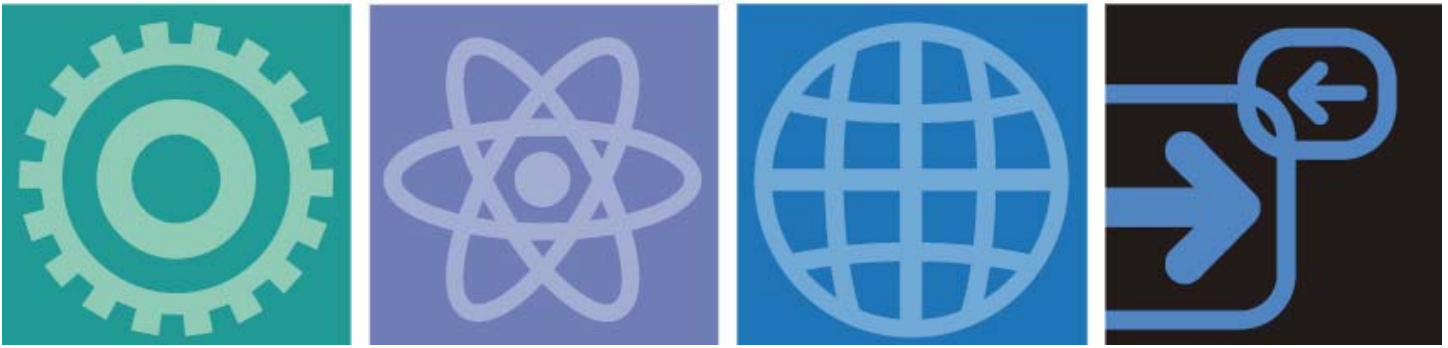
Staff at the Health Sciences Center received a presentation from Wolters Kluwer of Prep-U. The Prep-U software is a useful teaching tool for simulation labs.

The Northwest Campus hosted the National Student Nurse Association's membership meeting. Aureus Medical Group gave a presentation on hiring traveling nurses.

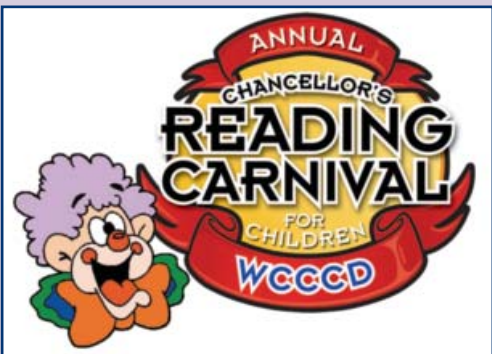


The School of Continuing Education and **Workforce Development**

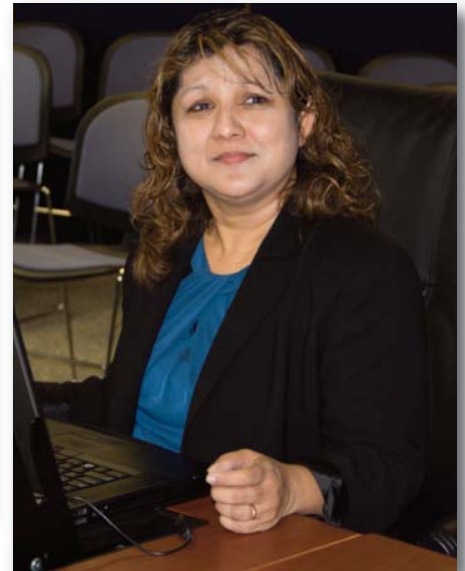

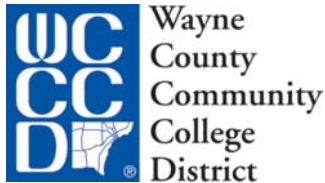
