WCCCD Career Programs Initiative is in week 10 of our 12 Weeks of Summer Career Focus Programs recruitment campaign. Each week, two career programs are promoted throughout the District. The programs that are being promoted this week include fashion design and business administration. There are three additional areas of interest accounting, entrepreneurship and global supply chain management.

**Global Supply Chain Management**  
**ABOUT THE PROGRAM**  
 The Global Supply Chain Management College Certificate program is a unique business program that prepares graduates for employment in the areas of logistics management, areas of logistics management, inventory control, materials management, and distribution management includes occupations such as supervisors and/or managers of transportation, storage, and/or distribution; helpers, laborers, and/or hand material movers; and transportation machine and vehicle material repairs. The program combines core educational courses in the area of customer service, supervision, and supply chain management.

**WHAT DO GLOBAL SUPPLY CHAIN MANAGEMENT PROFESSIONALS DO?**  
 Logistics analysts coordinate an organization's supply chain—the system that moves a product from its source to the consumer. They manage how a product is acquired.

**Business Administration**  
**ABOUT THE PROGRAM**  
 The Business Administration Associate of Arts and Associate of Applied Science degree programs are suitable for students presently employed in business and industry and seeking advancement, those seeking such a position immediately upon graduation and those anticipating transfer to a four-year institution. The student will complete core liberal arts and business courses. Those anticipating transfer should coordinate their studies with the transfer policies of the institutions to which they intend to transfer. In some instances, these students may find it more advantageous to pursue a more general associate degree.

**WHAT DO BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION GRADUATES DO?**  
 A degree in business administration can lead to a variety of careers in business, industry, government, and education. Graduates are employed in retail food franchises, manufacturing, and non-profit organizations, educational institutions, and government agencies.

**WHAT DO BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION GRADUATES DO?**  
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**Fashion Design**  
**ABOUT THE PROGRAM**  
 The Fashion Design Associate Degree and Certificate programs are designed for those individuals who have the motivation, precision and drive to design and create. Courses in both Degree and Certificate programs will offer students creative studies in design fundamentals, fashion analysis, design theory, sketching, textiles, color, pattern making, pattern grading, and draping construction. The Fashion Design degree and certificate will provide the training required for entry-level employment by the fashion industry or for custom design business operations.

**WHAT DO FASHION DESIGNERS DO?**  
 Fashion designers create original clothing, accessories, and footwear on how to make the products they designed. Fashion designers typically will:  
 • Study fashion trends and anticipate designs that will appeal to consumers  
 • Decide on a theme for a collection  
 • Use computer-aided design (CAD) programs to create designs on how to make the products they designed  
 • Visit manufacturers or trade shows to get samples of fabric  
 • Select fabrics, embellishments, colors, or a style for each garment or accessory  
 • Hire seamstresses or team members to create prototype designs  
 • Measure their designs on consumers

**Accounting**  
**ABOUT THE PROGRAM**  
 The Accounting Associate of Applied Science degree and Certificate programs are designed for those students presently employed in the accounting field and seeking advancement, and those seeking a position in the field immediately upon graduation. Areas where a student may find employment include but are not limited to: auditing, payroll, cost, budget and tax. In addition to the course work in Accounting, the student will complete courses in the liberal arts and other business disciplines.

**WHAT DO ACCOUNTING, BOOKKEEPING AND AUDITING CLERKS DO?**  
 Bookkeeping, accounting, and auditing clerks produce financial records for organizations. They update financial transactions, financial statements, and check financial records for accuracy. Accountants and auditors assess financial operations and work to help ensure that organizations run efficiently.

**Entrepreneurship**  
**ABOUT THE PROGRAM**  
 The Entrepreneurship College Certificate program is designed for those individuals who have, or for those individuals who have, or desire to have, their own business. Emphasis is on successfully creating and sustaining a small, competitive advantage in starting, managing and growing a small business. This program focuses on the preparation needed for small business ownership.

**WHAT DO ENTREPRENEURS DO?**  
 Entrepreneurship plays a vital role in the growth of the U.S. economy. Entrepreneurship is a process through which individuals identify opportunities, allocate resources, and create value. This creation of value is often through the identification of unmet needs or through the identification of opportunities for change.

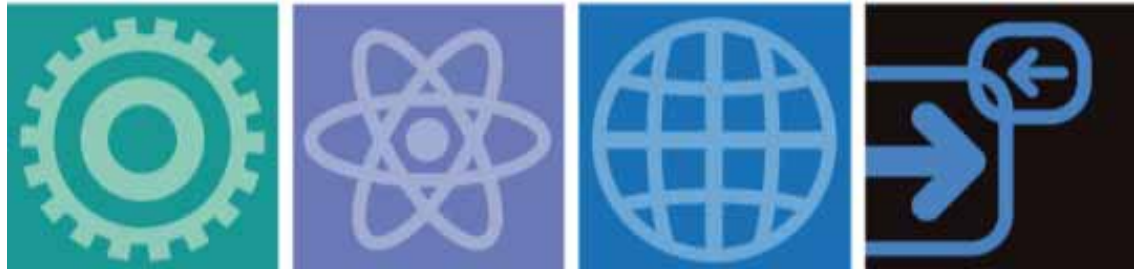


## District Police Authority

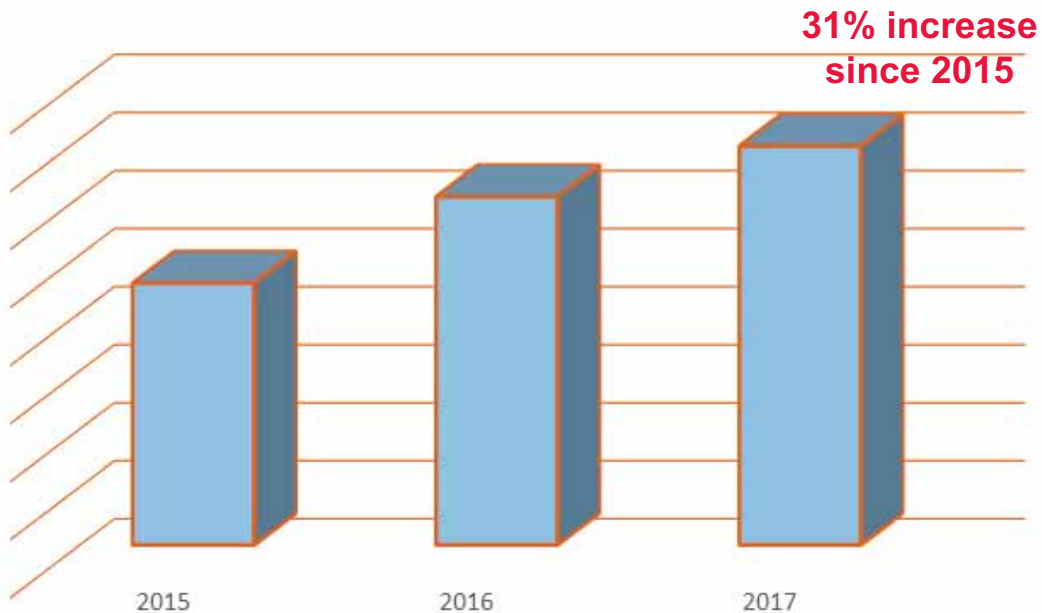

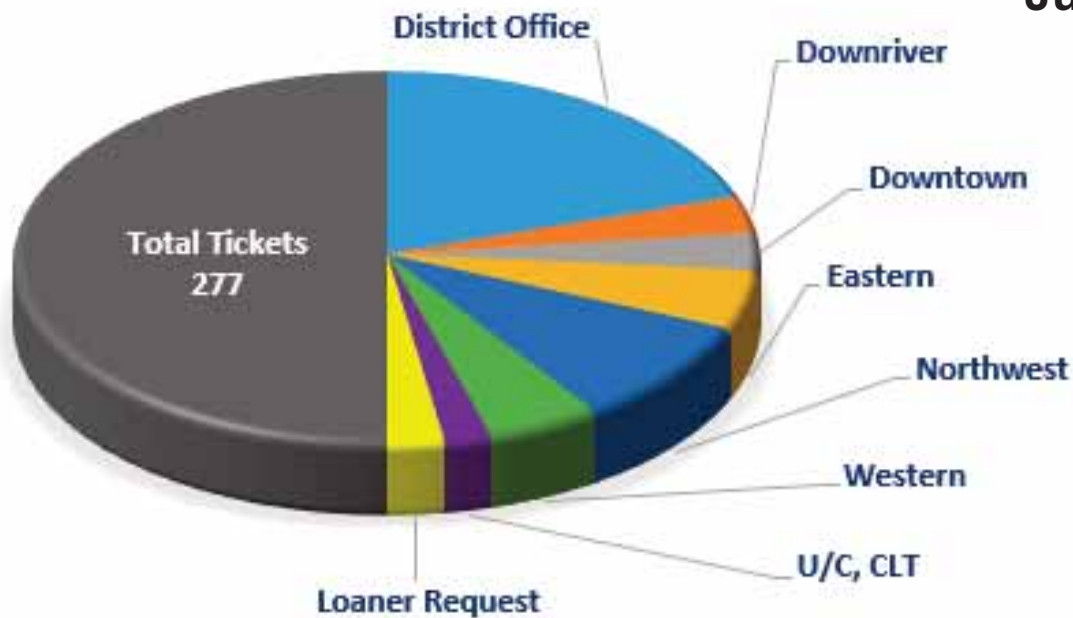

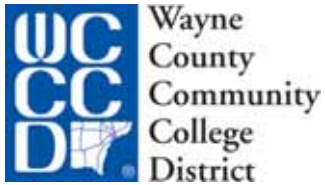
