WCCCD New Tour Site

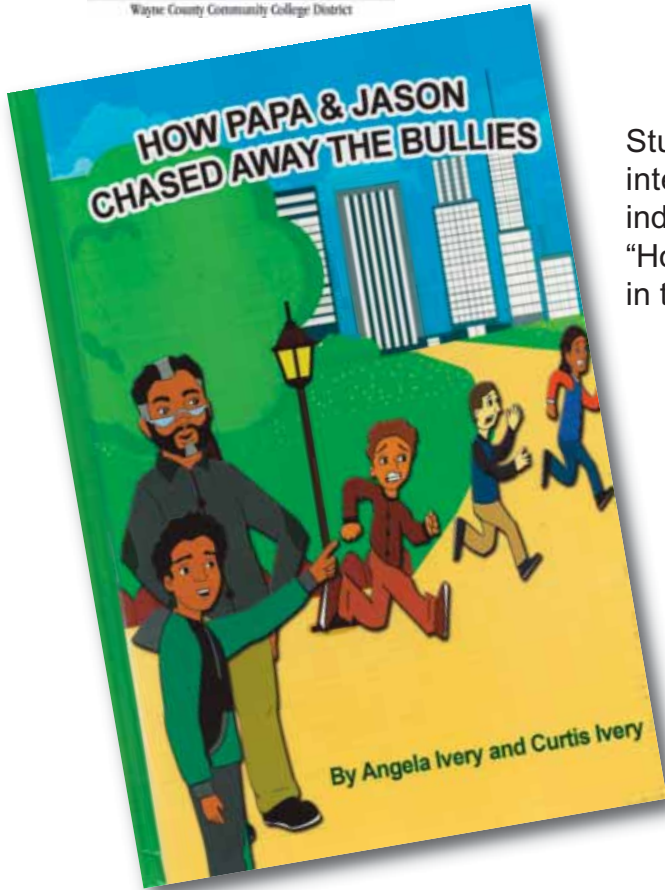

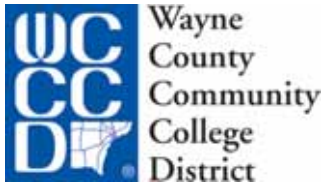


Romulus Adult Education Graduation
