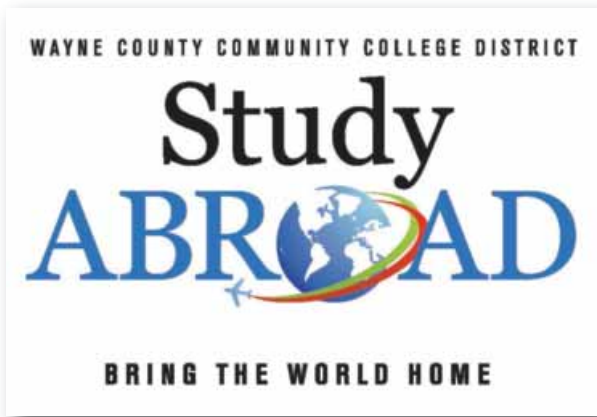


International Programs and Global Partnerships

WCCCD's 1st International Student Summer Festival brought international students together to celebrate the end of the semester. This was a great opportunity for cultural exchange and networking.

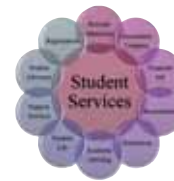




Bon Voyage!

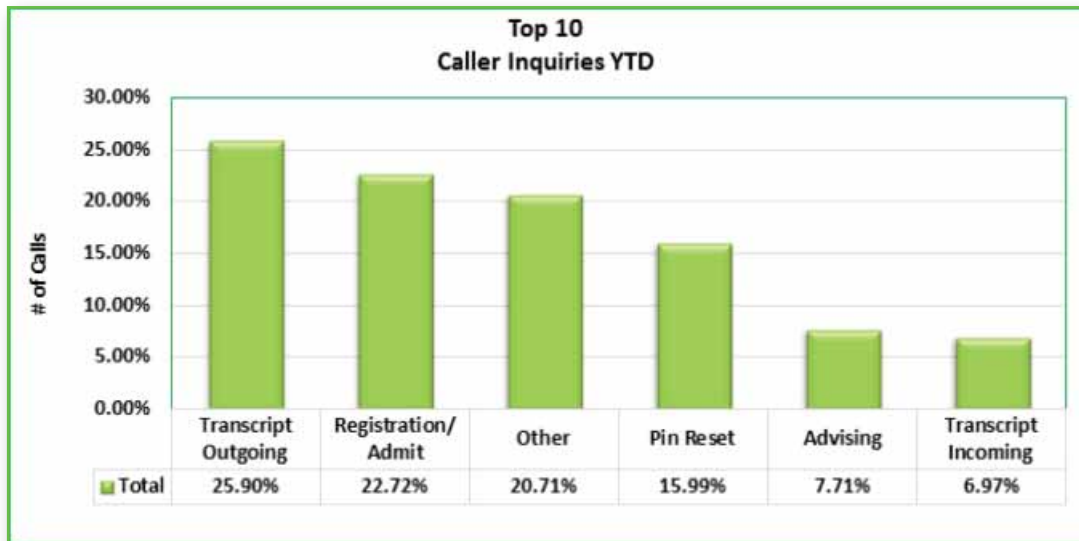


Admissions and Records

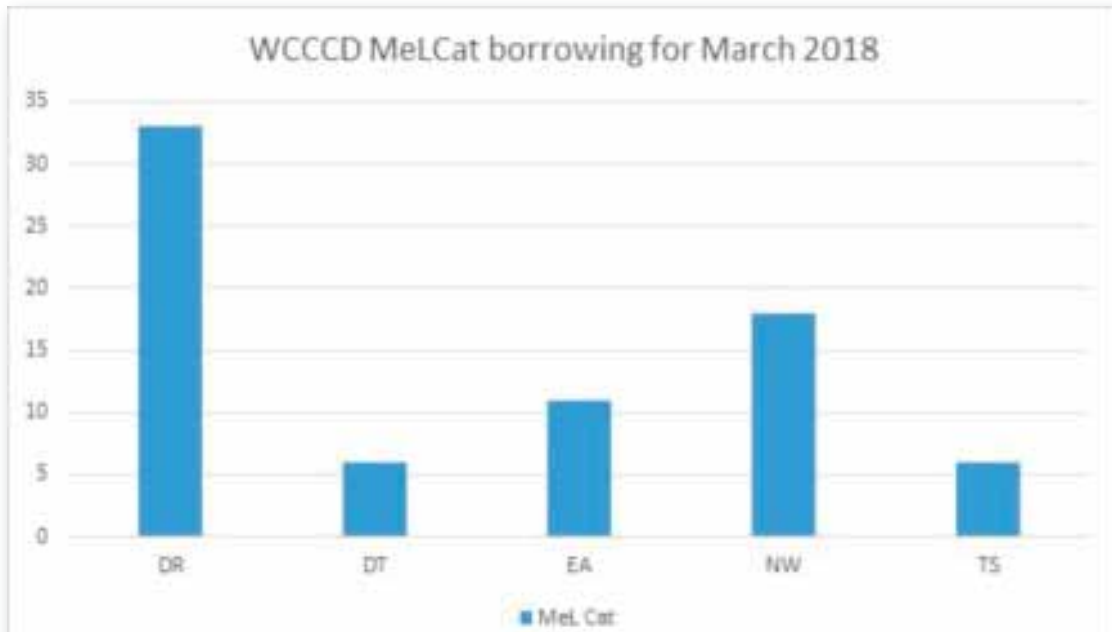
Online Learning Course Start-Up Preparations

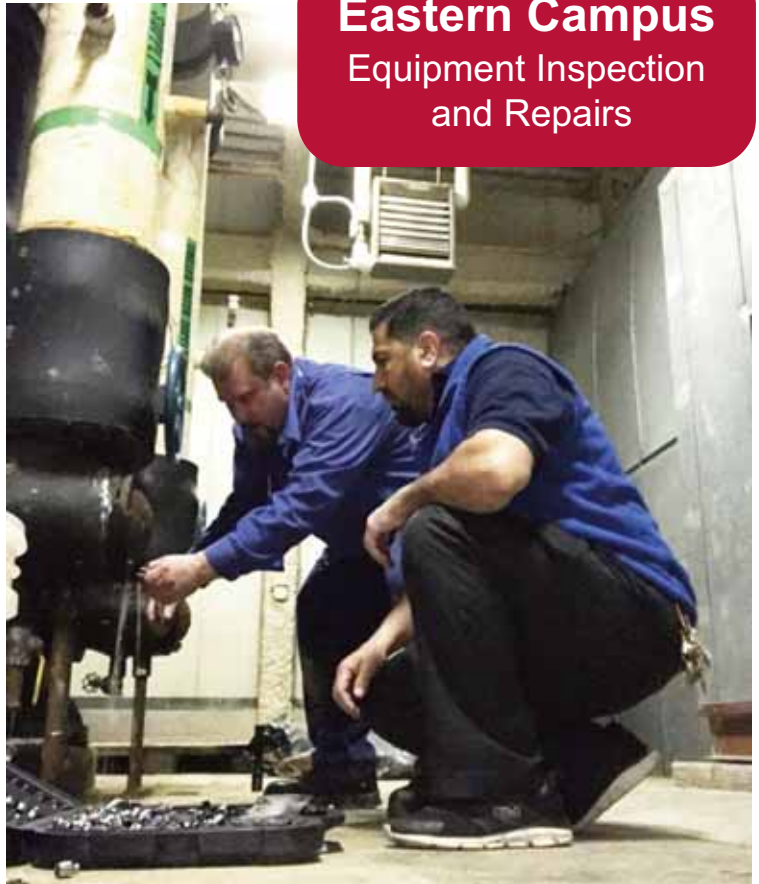

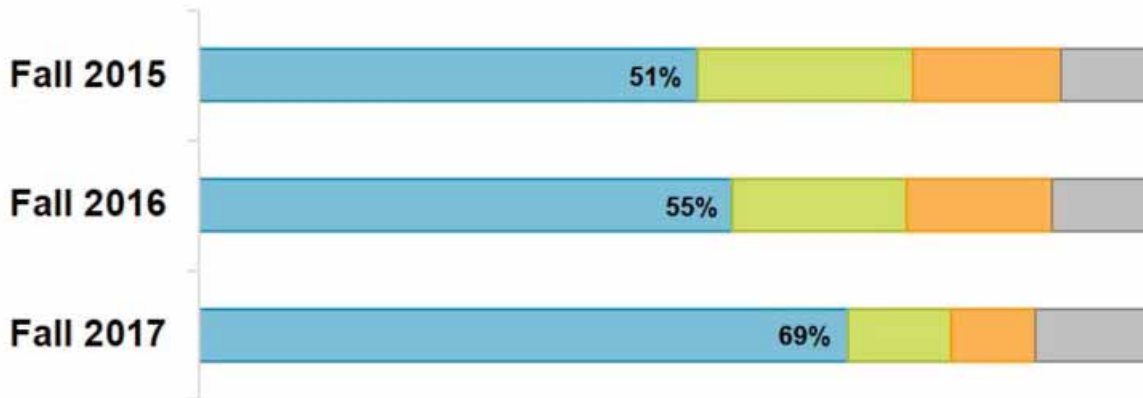

Craft Brewing Program Finals

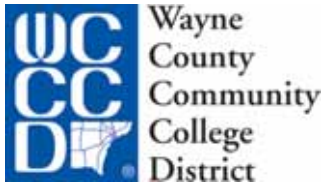
