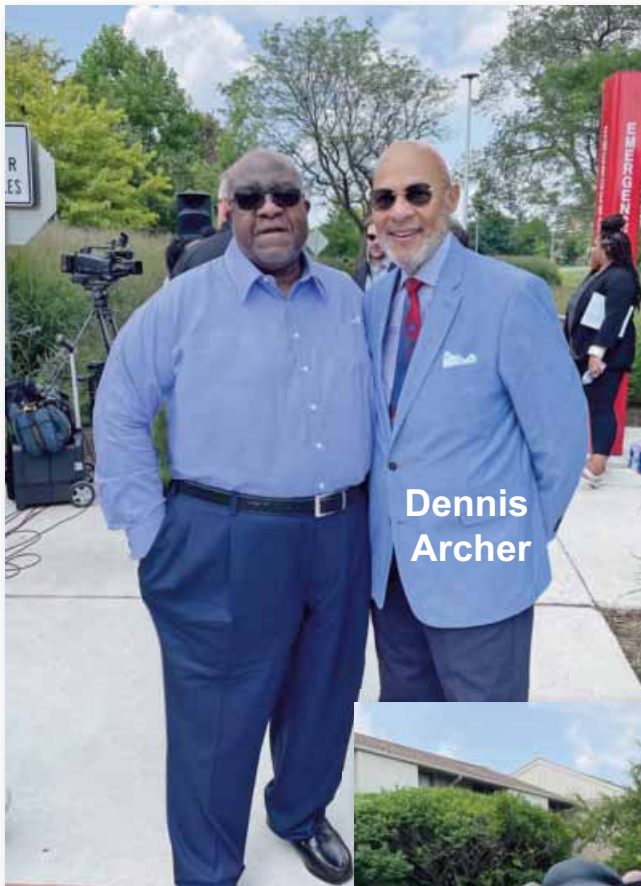

I participated in the naming ceremony of Detroit's new greenway in honor of former Mayor Dennis Archer.

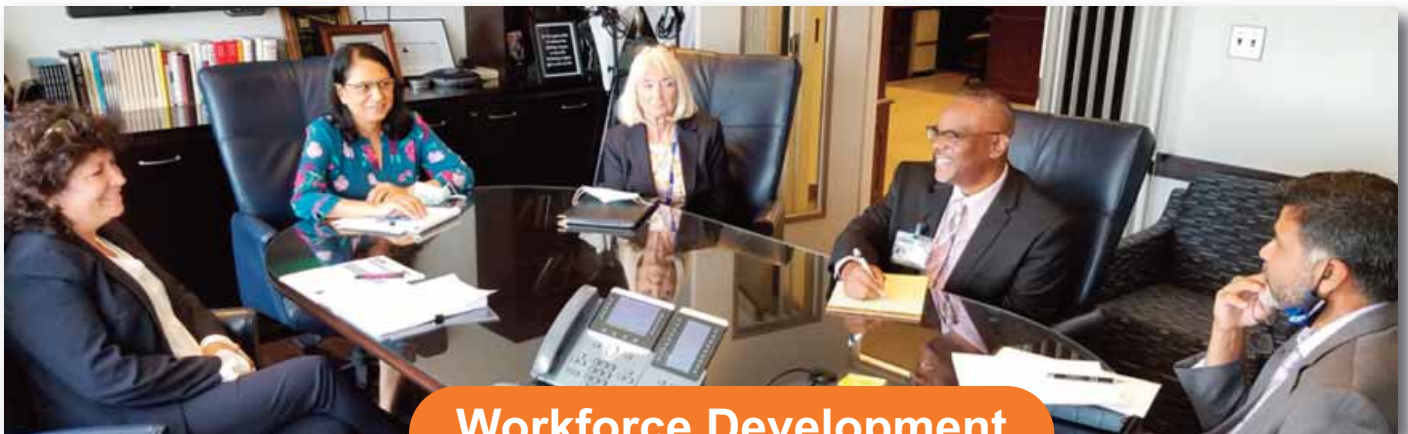

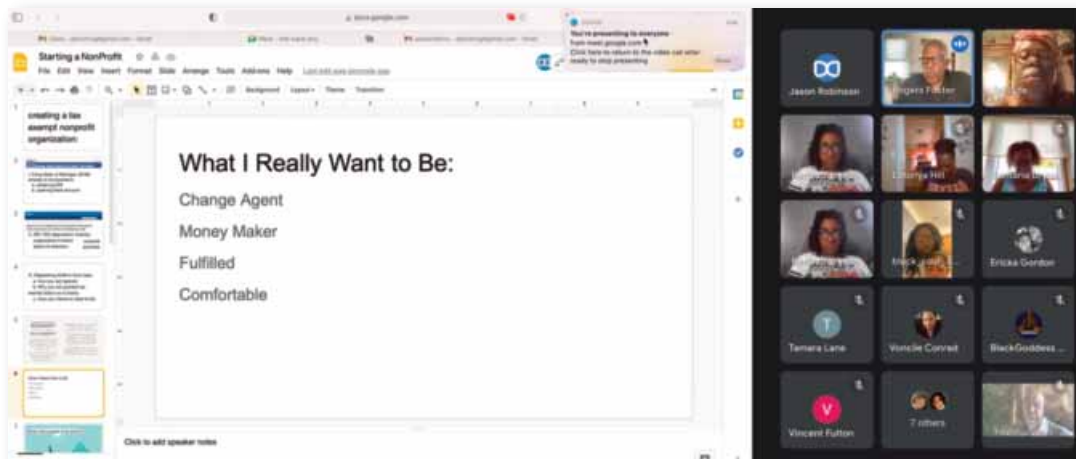

City of Detroit Entrepreneurship Training Academy

City of Detroit Entrepreneurship Training Academy (ETA) Cohort 6 began on Monday with 22 students enrolled by Detroit at Works from a waiting list of 400. This training focus includes “Starting a Childcare or Adult Day Care center and/or Youth services.” More than 90% of the participants work in social services and desire to launch a social entrepreneurial venture.

The Outdoor Training Center is reviewing additional “Best Practice” site changes to possibly include:

- A Utility Lineman Bootcamp modeled after Mott Community College in Flint MI.
- A “Roads Commission Lab” partnership with Wayne County Roads Division. Wayne County Roads Division is responsible for the maintenance of approximately 1,440 county primary and local roadways and 462 miles of state trunk lines and freeways.

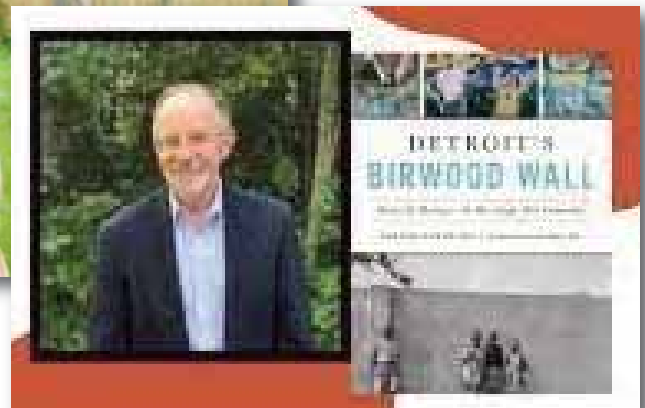

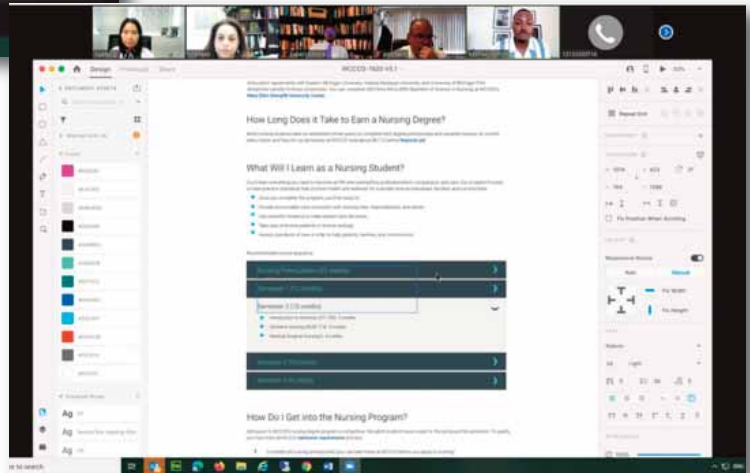

This week, the taskforce also met with the Division of Student Services to review pages in their respective division for updates as we prepare to migrate content to the new website.

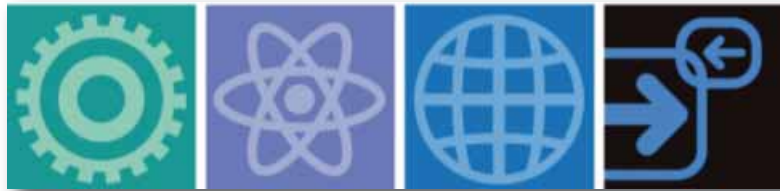

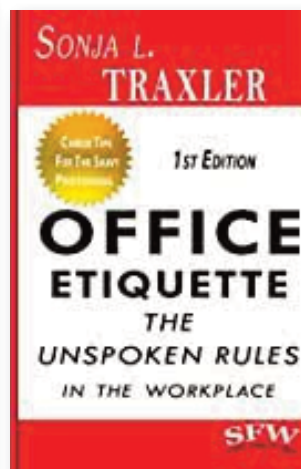

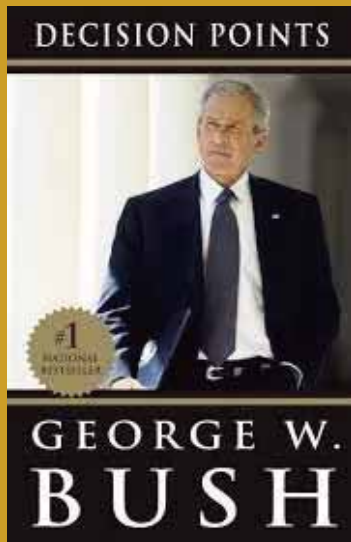

Gaining Wisdom from Losing

Many aspects of life can be seen as involving the experiences of winning and losing. We have all heard people say that they “are very competitive.” That is because we humans don’t like to lose, and we want to see ourselves as winners. But lose we will from time to time because losing is part of life.

What is important with losing, however, is what we learn from the experience. Cloud, in his book, *Integrity*, notes that “we all lose, and sometimes things will not turn out well and will be unable to be fixed, even with more perseverance, creativity, and resourcefulness.” The point is that sometimes we need to accept our losses and move on from them so we can focus on future successes rather than repeating our failures.

Winners learn from their losses so they don’t carry their loss patterns forward into their next endeavor. This is critical to future success in relationships or any business ventures to avoid repeating what caused the past failures. Sometimes character issues prevent people from letting go of their losses because of the emotional investment they have made. This might be true of a commitment to achieving a goal in business that is outside the mission or purpose of an organization, or it might be true of a failed marriage, however painful that may be.

Getting stuck in denial, anger, or sadness prevent some people from moving on, while healthy people are able to deal with losing as a part of life and reinvent themselves for future success. Gaining wisdom from losses and failures and properly grieving are healthy behavior, and they are most likely to help you become a high performer.
