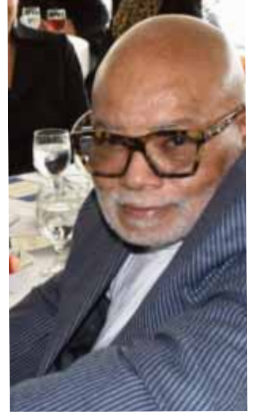


Community Update at the New Culinary Arts and Hospitality Center

Jim Crow and Popular Culture
 The image of black people in the white mind formed an outrageous distortion of individual blacks and their assumed cultural practices. Countless representations of impoverished blacks with ink-black skin, large thick red lips, and bulging eyeballs appeared almost everywhere in the public arena. Dozens of graphic artists and illustrators prospered as social commercial artists by drawing such images to sell products, showbills, and magazines. Today, your typical NET commercial does show some progress since the Jim Crow advertising days.

Student Services Informational Session

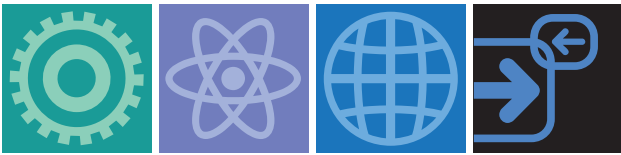

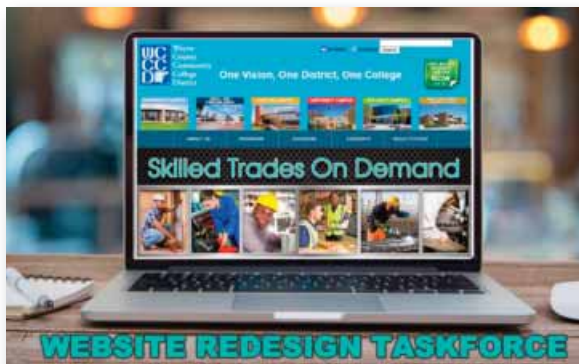
Staff from the Downriver and Ted Scott campuses attended the City of Taylor State of the City Address with Mayor Tim Woolley.

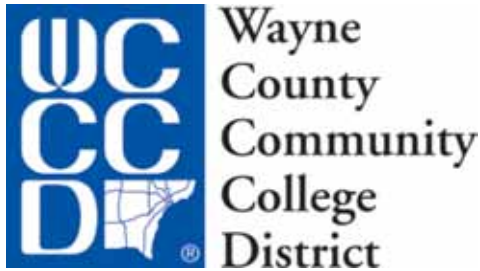
